





I have always found musical theater fascinating. I love to know how things were originally put together and what inspired them. That knowledge gives me a greater respect for the material and better understanding of the project I have agreed to undertake. This year marks the centennial celebration of Richard Rodgers, proving that the works of Rodgers and Hammerstein are timeless. SOUTH PACIFIC has a place in a long line of classic American musicals.

SOUTH PACIFIC was first produced in 1949. It was a collaboration of the efforts of Richard Rodgers, Oscar Hammerstein II and Joshua Logan. The team of Rodgers and Hammerstein had already become famous for OKLAHOMA! and CAROUSEL. They would go on to write THE KING AND I, ME AND JULIET, PIPE DREAM, FLOWER DRUM SONG and SOUND OF MUSIC.

For SOUTH PACIFIC, Oscar Hammerstein and director Joshua Logan collaborated in putting together a script from three stories in James Michener's Pulitzer prize winning book *Tales of the South Pacific*. Two romances are interwoven—one is about an average American nurse and an aristocratic French planter, the other about a naval officer and a native.

In Richard Rodgers' autobiography, he elaborates on the selection of the stories. "If the main love story is serious, the secondary romance is usually employed to provide comic relief, such as Will Parker and Ado Annie in OKLAHOMA, and Carrie Pipperidge and Enoch Snow in CAROUSEL. But in SOUTH PACIFIC, we had two serious themes, with the second becoming a tragedy when Joe Cable is killed during the mission. Breaking the rules didn't bother us, but we did think the show needed some comic leavening, so we went to still a third story about an affable wheeler-dealer named Luther Billis and added him to the cast."

As directors, Angie, Mike and I found SOUTH PACIFIC to be very challenging. First of all, the script itself contains three stories that have been rolled into one. There is more script without music than we have been used to dealing with. Second, the fact that the majority of the characters are military was a new challenge. We felt that it was important to represent the military as authentically as we could. In 2003 as in 1949, our country owes a debt of gratitude and respect to the men and women who have served us over the years, and as educators we felt that part of the SPA experience was important. We were fortunate to have Ken Sherwood and Norm Dutot around to share their military backgrounds with the kids and to keep us true to our initial goal. Third, we thought the struggles with racism in the stories was significant. In the time the show was written, Richard Rodgers writes that he didn't see "Carefully Taught" as a message song at all. It was just another song for Joe Cable to sing in Act 2. Over the years though, the song has become a theme for seniors and character education lessons. It reminds us that our lack of grace toward each other is learned.

We had to come to terms with the fact that SOUTH PACIFIC is a period piece, and that is the way it needed to be approached. History has much to teach us, and the era of World War II is something that all Americans should cling to as their own. SOUTH PACIFIC has allowed us this opportunity.




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
